ARTICLE 1: To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year in accordance with nominations to be offered at Town Meeting.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted to elect members of the Finance Committee as follows as follows Gary W. Anderson, Joseph L. Drolette, Adrian CJ Dufresne, Gardner Lewis, and Matt Murphy for 3 year terms

ARTICLE 2: To hear reports of Committees and Town Officers and act thereon

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted to accept reports presented by the School Building Committee, the Waste Water Superintendent and the Finance Committee

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to settle claims and suits which are pending or may arise against the Town. Or do or take any other action in the matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010, the Town voted Article 3 as printed.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept state or federal grants they deem beneficial to the Town, provided that the Board of Selectmen shall hold a public hearing prior to the Board's acceptance of any such grant, if said grant requires the Town to meet future conditions or requirements including anticipated future costs to the Town. Further, the Board of Selectmen shall advise the Finance Committee of such anticipated costs prior to the public hearing. Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted Article 4 as printed.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to assume the liability in the manner provided by Section 29 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by Chapter 5, Acts of 1955 for all damages that may be incurred by work to be performed by the Department of Public Works of Massachusetts for the improvement, development, maintenance and protection of tidal and non-tidal rivers and streams, harbors, tidewaters, foreshores and shores along a public beach, including Merrimack and Connecticut Rivers, in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws and authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver a bond of indemnity therefore to the Commonwealth. Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted Article 5 as printed.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the Elected Officials. Or do or take any other action in the matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted to fix the salaries of the Elected Officials as follows:

Moderator.....	\$ 1,500
Town Clerk.....	\$68,813
Selectmen (4).....	\$ 3,000
Chairman of Selectmen.....	\$ 3,500

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to create a revolving fund under the provisions of General Laws Chapter 10, Section 58 to be known as the "Cultural Council Revolving Account", said fund to be established and administered as follows:

- a) All receipts from the State Arts Lottery fund and any other receipts or donations to the Cultural Council shall be credited to the revolving fund.
- b) Funds may be expended without further appropriation for the operation and administration of its programs.
- c) All funds shall be expended by the Cultural Council.
- d) Expenditures may not exceed receipts during any fiscal year with no more than 5% of monies received from the State Aid Lottery Fund to be spent for administration.

All funds as shall not have been expended twelve months after receipt shall be segregated and subject to further appropriation by the Board of Selectmen for the purposes of G.L. Chapter 10, Sections 56 through 58, inclusive. Or do or take any other actions on this matter. On request of the Cultural Council and the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted to create a revolving fund under the provisions of General Laws Chapter 10, Section 58 to be known as the "Cultural Council Revolving Account", said fund to be established and administered as follows:

- a) All receipts from the State Arts Lottery fund and any other receipts or donations to the Cultural Council shall be credited to the revolving fund.
- b) Funds may be expended without further appropriation for the operation and administration of its programs.
- c) All funds shall be expended by the Cultural Council.
- d) Expenditures may not exceed \$5,800 during fiscal year 2011 with no more than 5% of monies received from the State Aid Lottery Fund to be spent for administration.

All funds as shall not have been expended twelve months after receipt shall be segregated and subject to further appropriation by the Board of Selectmen for the purposes of G.L. Chapter 10, Sections 56 through 58, inclusive.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize continued use of the following Revolving Funds previously established by Town Meeting votes:

- a. Code of Falmouth Revolving Fund as established by Article 3 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting.
- b. Falmouth Recreation Department Revolving Fund as established by Article 4 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting.
- c. Emerald House Revolving Fund as established by Article 28 of the November 2006 Annual Town Meeting.
- d. Shellfish Propagation Revolving Fund as established by Article 9 of the April 2006 Annual Town Meeting.
- e. Falmouth Historical Commission Revolving Fund as established by Article 12 of the April 2009 Special Town Meeting.

Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted to authorize continued use of the following Revolving Funds previously established by Town Meeting votes:

- A. Code of Falmouth Revolving Fund as established by Article 3 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting, with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for updating and publishing copies of the Code of Falmouth; b) all amounts received from the sale of copies of the Code of Falmouth and periodic updates shall be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the fund may be expended by the Town Clerk; and d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2011 shall not exceed \$5,400.
- B. Falmouth Recreation Department Fund as established by Article 4 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the operation and administration of the department's programs and activities; b) entrance and participation fees shall be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the funds may be expended by the Recreation Committee and; d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2011 shall not exceed \$10,000.
- C. Emerald House Revolving Fund as established by Article 28 of the November, 2006 Annual Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the maintenance of the Emerald House buildings and grounds; b) payments in lieu of rent received by the town shall be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the funds may be expended by the Facilities Manager; and d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2011 shall not exceed \$24,000.
- D. Shellfish Propagation Revolving Fund as established by Article 9 of the April, 2006 Annual Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the operation and administration of the department's shellfish propagation programs and activities; b) shellfish mitigation payments and related donations received by the Conservation Commission shall be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the funds may be expended by the Conservation Commission; and d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2011 shall not exceed \$10,000.
- E. Falmouth Historical Revolving Fund as established by Article 12 of the April, 2009 Special Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the operation and administration of its programs and activities; b) proceeds from the sale of the "Book of Falmouth" shall be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the

funds may be expended by the Historical Commission; and d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2011 shall not exceed \$2,700.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 240-3A. of the Code of Falmouth by adding a sentence at the end of the paragraph as follows:

“Except as hereinafter provided, this chapter shall not apply to structures or uses lawfully in existence or lawfully begun, or to a building or special permit issued before the date of the first publication of notice of the public hearing on such bylaw required by M.G.L. C. 40A, §5. **Anything to the contrary in the by-law notwithstanding, more than one dwelling a single lot shall be considered a lawful use if begun prior to May 19, 1959.**”

On request of the Zoning Board of Appeals

VOTED: By a declared two thirds vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted to amend Section 240-3C. of the Code of Falmouth by adding the following: Anything to the contrary in the zoning bylaw notwithstanding, the residential use of two or more dwellings on a single lot shall be deemed a pre-existing nonconforming use if commenced prior to to May 19, 1959. and may only be altered, extended or modified by special permit pursuant to this section provided the Board of Appeals finds through a preponderance of credible evidence that said use commenced prior to May 19, 1959 and has not been abandoned or not used for a period of two years or more. In approving any alteration, extension or modification the Board of Appeals shall require that the number of dwellings units shall be limited to the same as in existence on May 19, 1959.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town of Falmouth will vote to change the zoning Residential B District at 28 Nathan Ellis Highway North Falmouth Ma. Parcel (sic) 05-09-007A-001, to a B-2 Business District for Medical & Professional use only with Restriction to Retail (sic) and Restaurant and Market.

On petition of Antranig Minasian and others.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted Indefinite Postponement of Article 10.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town of Falmouth will vote to change the Property at 28 Nathan Ellis Highway Assessor’s Parcel 05-09-007A-001, from a Residential B District to a B-3 Business District as defined in Article X §240-48 paragraph B. with Restriction to Bank, computer Center, Rental (sic)/ Restaurant/Market.

On petition of Antranig Minasian and others.

VOTED: By a failed majority vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 5, 2010 the Town voted not to pass Article 11 as printed.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town of Falmouth will vote to amend the Town’s Position Classification Plan for the Human Services Department to be effective on July 1, 2010 as follows:
