



WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL APRIL TOWN MEETING
Monday, APRIL 6, 2009 AT 7:00 PM
For action on articles in the Warrant
COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

ARTICLE 1: To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year in accordance with nominations to be offered at Town Meeting.

VOTED: By a declared majority vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to elect members of the Finance Committee as follows Frances S. Connolly, Weatherly B. Dorris, Stephen Fassett, Barbara Peri and Susan Smith for three year terms

ARTICLE 2: To hear reports of Committees and Town Officers and act thereon.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to accept reports presented by the School Building Committee, the Waste Water Superintendent and the Finance Committee

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to settle claims and suits which are pending or may arise against the Town. Or do or take any other action in the matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted Article 3 as printed.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept state or federal grants they deem beneficial to the Town, provided that the Board of Selectmen shall hold a public hearing prior to the Board's acceptance of any such grant, if said grant requires the Town to meet future conditions or requirements including anticipated future costs to the Town. Further, the Board of Selectmen shall advise the Finance Committee of such anticipated costs prior to the public hearing. Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted Article 4 as printed.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to assume the liability in the manner provided by Section 29 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by Chapter 5, Acts of 1955 for all damages that may be incurred by work to be performed by the Department of Public Works of Massachusetts for the improvement, development, maintenance and protection of tidal and non-tidal rivers and streams, harbors, tidewaters, foreshores and shores along a public beach, including Merrimack and Connecticut Rivers, in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws and authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver a bond of indemnity therefore to the Commonwealth. Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted Article 5 as printed.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the Elected Officials. Or do or take any other action in the matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a declared majority vote, a quorum being present on Tuesday April 7, 2009 the Town voted to fix the salaries of the Elected Officials as follows:

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to authorize continued use of the following Revolving Funds previously established by Town Meeting votes:

- a. Code of Falmouth Revolving Fund as established by Article 3 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting.
- b. Falmouth Recreation Department Revolving Fund as established by Article 4 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting.
- c. Emerald House Revolving Fund as established by Article 28 of the November 2006 Annual Town Meeting.
- d. Shellfish Propagation Revolving Fund as established by Article 9 of the April 2006 Annual Town Meeting.

Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to authorize continued use of the following Revolving Funds previously established by Town Meeting votes:

- A. Code of Falmouth Revolving Fund as established by Article 3 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting, with the following provisions: A) funds may be expended for updating and publishing copies of the Code of Falmouth; b) all amounts received from the sale of copies of the Code of Falmouth and periodic updates may be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the fund may be expended by the Town Clerk; and d) the amount which may be expended in any fiscal year shall not exceed receipts with the provision that any expenditure in excess of \$500.00 shall be subject to approval by the Board of Selectmen.
- B. Falmouth Recreation Department Fund as established by Article 4 of the April 1998 Annual Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the operation and administration of the department's programs and activities; b) entrance and participation fees may be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the funds may be expended by the Recreation Committee and; d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2010 shall not exceed receipts with the provision that any expenditure in excess of \$500.00 shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.
- C. Emerald House Revolving Fund as established by Article 28 of the November, 2006 Annual Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the maintenance of the Emerald House buildings and grounds; b) payments in lieu of rent received by the town may be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the funds may be expended by the Facilities Manager; and d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2010 shall not exceed receipts with the provision that any expenditure in excess of \$500.00 shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.
- D. Shellfish Propagation Revolving Fund as established by Article 9 of the April, 2006 Annual Town Meeting with the following provisions: a) funds may be expended for the operation and administration of the department's shellfish propagation programs and activities; b) shellfish mitigation payments and related donations received by the Conservation Commission may be credited to the Revolving Fund; c) the funds may be expended by the Conservation Commission; and d) the amount which may be expended in fiscal year 2010 shall not exceed receipts with the provision that any expenditure in excess of \$500.00 shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote that any funds received by the Town of Falmouth as part of the Medicaid Medical Services Program (defined in M.G.L. c44, §72) are allotted to the School Committee for use under its jurisdiction for the benefit of educational programs, or do or take any other action related to this matter. On request of the Falmouth School Committee.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to Indefinite Postponement of Article 8..

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to amend the first sentence of Article XIV, §240-66C.3 of the Zoning Bylaws to read as follows:

Any *vacant* lot held in common ownership with such adjoining lots as of 1 January 1981 may be treated as not held in common ownership if, as of 1 January 1981, a dwelling was in existence on all the other commonly held, contiguous lots, or if subsequent to 1 January 1981 the lot was no longer held in common ownership and a dwelling was permitted by special permit on each of such adjoining lots.

Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Zoning Board of Appeals

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to amend Section 240-

66.C.4 of the Zoning Bylaw by adding the word "vacant" so as to read:

"Any lot held in common ownership with such adjoining lots, **vacant** as of 1 January 1981, may be treated as not held in common ownership if, as of 1 January 1981, a dwelling was in existence on all the other commonly held, contiguous lots, or if subsequent to 1 January 1981 the lot was no longer held in common ownership and a dwelling was permitted by special permit on each of such adjoining lots."

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to add a Definition to Article III, §240-13 of the Zoning Bylaws as follows:

VACANT – Empty, unoccupied, deprived of contents, without inanimate objects; implies non-occupancy for any purposes.

Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to Indefinite Postponement of Article 10.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to amend Article XXX, Section 240-162 of the Zoning Bylaws as follows:

§Section 240-162. Home Occupations. The Building/Zoning Commissioner shall be responsible for permitting home occupations based on the criteria found in paragraphs A through E below. The Building Commissioner may require information in the form of plans, specifications or studies to determine compliance with paragraphs A through E as may be necessary in his opinion. The Building Commissioner may limit the timeframe of said permit to specific times of the day or seasons; or may issue a temporary permit subject to renewal. The Building Commissioner is further authorized to revoke any permit found not to be in compliance with paragraphs A through E below, or further restrict the activities subject to the permit as may be in the best interests of the neighborhood or town.

AMENDMENT: (Bazycki) To add" a fee shall never be charged for registering a Home Occupation."

VOTED: By a counted vote of 104 in favor and 95 opposed, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to amend Article 11 by adding a fee shall never be charged for registering a Home Occupation

VOTED: By a declared vote, failing to receive the required two-thirds, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted not to pass Article 11 as amended.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Official Zoning Map to rezone properties located on Nathan Ellis Highway (Route 151) zoned Agriculture AA to Senior Care Retirement District (Article XIII.1) as shown on Assessors Map:

VOTED: By a declared vote, failing to receive the required two-thirds, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted not to pass Article 12..

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to vote to amend the Zoning By-Law, with respect to both Section 240-23.I(4), applicable to permitting an accessory apartment in a Single Residence District, and Section 240-38.I(4), applicable to permitting an accessory apartment in an Agricultural District, so that each such section reads as follows (new language in italics, all other language unchanged):

(4) If the subject lot is within a Water Resource Protection District (Article XV) or Coastal Pond Overlay District (Article

XXI), the total number of bedrooms shall not exceed one per 13,500 square feet of lot area unless (1) for new construction, the total number of bedrooms shall not exceed three, or (2) for an existing dwelling, the total number of bedrooms on the lot in the principal and accessory apartment shall not exceed the number of bedrooms on the lot before the accessory apartment was created, or (3) both the principal unit and accessory apartment are served by either the municipal sewer system or a septic system that has certification from the Massachusetts Department of Protection (Mass. DEP) for general use for nitrogen reduction and is listed in the most current Mass. DEP list of innovative and alternative subsurface sewage disposal technologies approved for use in Massachusetts, but in no case will a technology providing total nitrogen reduction of less than 50% as determined by Mass. DEP be eligible.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted Article 13 as printed in the warrant.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town of Falmouth will vote to change from a Single Residence B District to a Business District 1 zoning district the following described land:

The property known and numbered as 28 Nathan Ellis Highway, Falmouth, Massachusetts, and identified as Town of Falmouth map 05, section 09, parcel 007A, lot 001.

On petition of Antranig Minasian and others.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to Indefinite Postponement of Article 14.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town of Falmouth will take by eminent domain, that portion of Winslow Road from the end of the existing public road layout, easterly and northeasterly, over the existing subdivision road to the cul de sac in North Falmouth, all as shown on a plan entitled "TOWN OF FALMOUTH PLAN OF WINSLOW ROAD AT NORTH FALMOUTH, MA AS LAID OUT BY THE SELECTMEN SCALE 1" = 40' DECEMBER 19, 2007", by Holmes and McGrath, Inc. or do or take any other action as required.

On petition of Michael B. McGrath and others.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted to Indefinite Postponement of Article 15.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to rescind Article 19 of the April 2003 Annual Town Meeting which totals \$15,900.00; said Article 19 authorized the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Board of Selectmen to expend money from the Land Bank Fund for the acquisition of Land now or formerly of Marilyn P. Costa shown on Assessors Map #39, Section 11, Parcel 001A, Lot 000 and described in the Barnstable County Registry of Deeds in Book 00406, Page 0041, or do or take any other action on this matter. On the request of the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Monday, April 6, 2009 the Town voted Article 16 as printed.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to PURCHASE, OR TAKE BY EMINENT DOMAIN permanent and temporary construction easements in and around the Chapoquoit Bridge in Falmouth, Barnstable County, Massachusetts for the purpose of reconstructing the Chapoquoit Bridge, said easements to be on such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen deem appropriate, and being described as follows:

- B) In addition to the remedies provided in Section 11 herein, the Building Commissioner is hereby authorized to enforce the provisions of this chapter, subject to a vote of the Commission that determines the construction, alteration, demolition or moving of any building or structure would be in violation of this chapter. The provisions of the state building code notwithstanding, the Building Commissioner is authorized to withhold any permit for construction, alteration, demolition, or the moving, use or occupancy of any building or structure until such time as the Commission issues a determination that compliance with its Certificate of Appropriateness has been accomplished or that the Commission has received surety for the completion of construction or other authorized

site activities pursuant to sections 9(A)(1) or 9(A)(2) above.

C) Any person violating any of the provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction fined not more than \$500 for each offense. Each day that such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE 33: Proposal to the Town of Falmouth
by People for Cats
January 9, 2009

People for Cats is an all-volunteer, non-profit, 501(c)(3) organization based in Falmouth. It was started in 1993 by a group of residents that was concerned about the large number of stray and feral cats on the streets of Falmouth. Volunteers began spaying and vaccinating them against rabies and finding homes for adoptable ones. In 2001, we established a no-kill shelter on Beagle Lane on property owned by Frank Alfano, DVM. We have placed over 2,000 cats and spayed/neutered several hundred feral cats and kittens since 2001. One of our main goals is to reduce the feral cat population in Falmouth and we have seen great progress thanks to our low-cost spay/neuter program for cat owners and out trap/neuter/release program for feral cats.

Every year more and more residents look to us for assistance with spaying and neutering, taking in stray cats in their neighborhoods, providing financial assistance for food and veterinary care and surrendering their cats when they can no longer care for them. In addition, we respond to requests from Falmouth Animal Control to handle stray and feral cats. The approximately 600-sq.ft. building we currently occupy is inadequate for these activities. A building that is better suited to the care of animals, as well as to the needs of our volunteers and the community, is very much needed.

People for Cats is looking for affordable options for a new shelter, one being leasing land from the town for a reasonable fee and constructing an approximately 2,400-sq.ft building on it. After looking at available town land, we feel that parcel #260571 on Brick Kiln Road might be well suited to our purpose, provided it is buildable.

People for Cats hereby requests that the town consider this proposal for a long-term lease of parcel #260571 on Brick Kiln Road to People for Cats on which the organization could build a shelter that would more adequately serve the community.

Or do or take any other action on this matter. On request of the Finance Committee and the Board of Selectmen.

VOTED: By a unanimous vote, a quorum being present on Tuesday, April 7, 2009 the Town voted that all articles approved at this town meeting be funded as voted for a total of \$108,274,628.00 and the Board of Selectmen are directed to submitted to the voters at the Annual Town Election in May 2010 a question to approve Article 30.
